2022 Horseless Rally

Saturday, March 19th, (March 26th Rain date) Portuguese Bend Pony Club

A Jumping phase and a Dressage phase will be executed by the competitor on foot. All un-mounted activities are conducted identical to a mounted rally.

Jumping phase will be 7-10 fences not to exceed 12" - 20".

Dressage tests will be executed in Dressage arena. "Readers" for the dressage test are permitted. Dressage Tests are chosen on preference and not based on certification level. Choose one:

Each competitor (rider) bring:

* Model "Horse" (Breyer, My Little Pony, etc) and a shoe box "stall" (decorated-optional)

*Individual Required Equipment (pg 60 USPC HM Rules for Rallies attached) Non-Members can share.

* 1 copy of chosen Dressage Test (find 3 tests attached and pick one).

*Saddle, Saddle Pad, Saddle Stand, Bridle, Grooming Kit, Halter & Lead Rope. Non-Members can share.

^{*} Label all personal items and equipment.

Stall card filled out correctly for 1 day rally (pg 47, USPC HM Rules for Rallies attached) *Stick horse optional. Competitors can "Bridle" a team mate for Dressage test.

Each team bring:

*All items listed on the second and third columns on the USPC Horse Management Required Equipment Checklist (pg 60 USPC HM Rules for Rallies attached) – Two teams from the same club may share team required equipment and will share any penalty points.

*Each team will have their own areas to put their "horses", shoe boxes, and hang water buckets.

*Each team will bring an Easy-Up to use as your team tack room.

*Each team must have a chaperone and at least 1 adult volunteer (if a club sends two teams then one chaperone can be designated for both teams (or partial 2nd team)

Equipment may be labeled with the team name (club) or the name of one of the team members. Please label the Competitor's name or number on the rack for their saddle/bridle. If something is misplaced, we want to make sure you get it back!

Note to DCs & Parents: This is a teaching rally appropriate to the age and rating levels of those attending. Make sure your competitors understand that for this rally we are allowing exceptions to the rules in order to offer a positive learning introduction to the rally experience.

Appendix III: Chaperone and Emergency Contact Information

Team Chaperones vs. Emergency Contacts

When competitors under the age of majority (minors) participate in a rally, there will be a designated "Official Team Chaperone." In the situation of scramble teams, the official team chaperone will be appointed by the rally officials and will be so noted in the rally program. The team chaperone serves as the team contact for rally and a responsible guiding presence to prepare the team for success. Competitors who are above the age of majority (adults) participating in a rally will not have a designated chaperone but must submit the name and contact information for their emergency contact.

Team Chaperones

Time Commitment

The official team chaperone is responsible for team members during the hours of competition and on competition grounds only (from arrival on grounds until departing rally ground at beginning and end of each day of competition).

Transportation, Driving and Lodging

 Decisions to allow a competitor to drive or not, who they can or cannot ride with, who they can or cannot have in a vehicle that they are driving, where they stay at night and with whom they stay, and who is to be responsible for a competitor are all decisions that must be made by the parent/legal guardian. These decisions are not a decision of USPC, their region, club/ center, or the rally organizer. Specific arrangements must be made by and between the parent/legal guardian and the adult assuming any of these responsibilities in the absence of the parent/guardian.

Preparing Your Team for Success

- Initiate contact with all team members prior to leaving for the competition and gather cell phone numbers as appropriate. In cases of scramble team members, request contact information from the rally secretary. Share this information with team captain and/or stable manager.
- Encourage the team to have meetings prior to leaving for rally. Be sure all members of a scramble team are included in the decision-making process, either by email or phone contact, if a distance away.
- Discuss team equipment, review all rules that apply and any decisions regarding snacks, drinks, plans for meals, etc. Determine how the team members plan to provide snacks and drinks (i.e., each team member contribute a sum of money to a pot or each member is assigned specific items to bring). If each is contributing money, it must be collected before the rally. Be sure to know who is bringing cooler(s), as to avoid a trip to the local store.
- Plan arrival time at the competition site and any details such

as arrangements for ordering bedding, if needed, and who is assigned to do this (again collect money in advance if needed).

- On the first day of the rally, gather the team together before they separate for the night and make plans for the next day. Include a review of their competition schedule and how they can best work together to help each other prepare.
- Determine a regular meeting place and de-brief the team at the end of each day of competition. Take this opportunity to offer words of praise, acknowledge their accomplishments, and encourage the sense of teamwork and team building. Guide the team towards constructive criticism and steer them away from finger pointing. Have the team make plans for the next day concerning time they will arrive on the competition grounds, who will feed mounts the next morning, who will re-supply the tack room cooler with ice, drinks and snacks (get requests for drinks/ snacks) and make the plans for lunch. Be sure any plans for cooler and/ or lunch delivery follow any requirements as stated in the competition entry and they understand the plan. Have the team leave with a plan for the next day in place before they go off for an evening of relaxation.

Emergency Contacts

Anyone listed as an emergency contact for a competitor should be reachable by phone for the duration of the competition. Emergency contacts do not need to be on the competition grounds, but ideally are also within driving distance of the competition in the case of an emergency.

Appendix III: Chaperone Form

To be completed by the chaperone and turned in with the rally entry for USPC members below the age of majority.

Chaperone duties shall include:

1. The primary function of the "Official Team Chaperone" is to ensure that there is a contact person for every USPC member below the age of majority, on the grounds for the duration of the competition.

2. While multiple Chaperone Forms may be turned in for a single team, only one person will be designated the Official Team Chaperone. If the Official Team Chaperone must leave the grounds during the competition, they must delegate the team chaperone duties to another responsible adult, making it clear that they are to respond to rally officials and any team members in your absence.

3. Be present and available to rally officials and all team members for the duration of the competition.

4. Being in contact with parents/guardians for all team members during competition hours.

5. Being in contact with all team members and their parents/guardians outside of competition hours.

6. Have copy of and be familiar with the current discipline

rulebook and the current Horse Management Handbook. Rulebooks available for download from <u>www.ponyclub.org</u>.

7. Be aware that USPC members are required to wear a current, up to date USPC medical card/bracelet on their arm at all USPC activities.

8. Be familiar with the effects of heat and humidity and the potential risk for heat related illness. Take an active role in helping to keep all team members well hydrated and take every opportunity to encourage water breaks.

9. Uphold USPC Substances and Weapons Policy which prohibits the inappropriate or illegal use of any substance, including but not limited to drugs or alcohol, by anyone participating in any manner. Weapons of any kind are forbidden. Refer to About/About the Organization/By-Laws, Policies and Resolutions on <u>www.ponyclub.org</u> for the full policy statement.

10. Remember that administration of medications is the sole responsibility of the parent/guardian.

1. <u>Registration of Rider and Agreement Purpose</u>: I, the following listed individual, for him or herself and on behalf of his/her parents, siblings, my heirs, estate, assigns, including all minor children, agents and personal representatives (collectively "Rider"), do hereby agree that she/he shall use the facilities of the Club which are located in the area known as Portuguese Bend, Rancho Palos Verdes, CA ("Premises"), which Premises are owned by The Brown Family Trust ("Trust"), for the purpose of horseback riding, storage of tack and stabling of horses on ______, and from time to time thereafter, until ______, at which time this Release shall terminate.

- 2. <u>Agreement Scope and Territory and Definitions</u>: This Agreement, which includes, among other thing, paragraph 1 immediately above is made part of this Agreement by this reference, shall be legally binding upon the Rider, agents and personal representatives and it shall be interpreted according to the laws of the State of California. The term "horse" shall refer to all equine species. The term "horseback riding" shall refer to riding or otherwise handling of horses, ponies, mules, or donkeys, whether from the ground or mounted. The terms "Rider" ad "rider" shall also refer to a person who rides a horse or otherwise handles or comes near a horse from the ground. The terms me and my shall refer to the Rider.
- 3. <u>Activity Risk Classification</u>: Rider understands that horseback riding is a rugged adventure recreational sport activity and that there are numerous obvious and non-obvious inherent risks always present in such activity despite all safety precautions. Related injuries can be severe requiring hospitalization and can result in more lasting residual effects than injuries from participating in other activities.
- 4. <u>Nature of Club Horses</u>: No horse is safe. Horses are 5 to 15 times larger, 20 to 40 times more powerful, and 3 to 4 times faster than a human. If a rider falls from horse to the ground it will generally be a distance from 3 1/2 to 5 1/2 feet, and the impact may result in injury or even death to the rider. Horseback riding is the only sport where one such small, weaker predator animal (human) tries to impose it's will on another much larger, stronger prey animal with a mind of it's own (horse) and each has a limited understanding of the other. If a horse is frightened or provoked it may divert from it's training and act according to it's natural

survival instincts which may include, but be not limited to: stopping short; changing directions or speed at will; shifting it's weight; bucking; rearing; kicking; biting; or running from danger.

- 5. <u>Rider Responsibility</u>: Upon mounting a horse, Rider is solely responsible for the control of the horse. Rider's safety depends upon his/her ability to carry out simple instructions, and his/her ability to remain balanced aboard the moving animal. Rider agrees the he/she shall be responsible for his/her own safety, the safety of the horse and the safety of other riders and horses on the Premises and areas adjacent to the Premises.
- 6. <u>Conditions of Nature</u>: Rider understands that neither the Club nor the Trust are responsible for the total or partial acts, occurrences, or elements of nature that can scare a horse, cause it to fall, or react in some other unsafe way. Some examples are: thunder; lightning; rain; wind; water; wild and domestic animals; insects; reptiles, which may walk, run, or fly near, or bite, or sting a horse or the Rider, and irregular footing on out of door, groomed or wild land which is subject to the constant change in condition according to weather, temperature, and natural and manmade changes in the landscape.
- 7. <u>Carry on Objects and Sharp Noises</u>: Rider understands that he/she must not carry loose items which may fall, blow away, flap in the wind, bounce or make sharp noises, possibly scaring a horse and shall avoid making sharp, loud noises, such as screaming or yelling, which may scare a horse.
- 8. <u>Saddle Girths Natural Loosening</u>: Rider understands that saddle girths (saddle fasteners around horse's belly) may loosen during a ride and shall alert nearest guide or wrangler as quickly as possible so action can be taken to avoid slippage of saddle and potential fall from the animal.
- 9. <u>Accident/Medical Insurance</u>: Rider agrees that should emergency medical treatment be required, that Rider and Rider's own accident/medical insurance company shall be solely responsible for and shall pay all expenses of and every nature arising out of or in connection with such treatment. Neither the Club nor the Trust shall not be liable to Rider claims, actions, damage, liability, and expense, including but not limited to the action or failure to act or the negligence of the beneficiaries, agents, contractors, invitees, or employees, officers or directors of the Club or the Trust.

UNITED STATES PONY CLUBS, INC. GENERAL ACTIVITY RELEASE, ASSUMPTION OF RISK, WAIVER OF LIABILITY, AND INDEMNITY AGREEMENT FOR USPC NON-MEMBERS

This document waives important legal rights. Read it carefully before signing.

I AGREE for myself, and/or my child, my/our administrators and assigns, in consideration for my, and/or my child's, participation in this United States Pony Clubs, Inc. (USPC) activity to the following:

I AGREE that I choose to participate voluntarily in an USPC activity, as a rider, driver, handler, lessee, owner, agent, spectator, volunteer, and/or trainer. I am fully aware and acknowledge that horse sports and USPC activities involve inherent dangerous risks of accident, loss, and serious bodily injury including, but not limited to, broken bones, head injuries, trauma, pain, suffering or death ("Harm"). I fully understand that this release covers, but is not limited to, inherent risks of an equine activity which mean a danger or condition that is an integral part of an equine activity, including but not limited to, any of the following:

- The propensity of an equine to behave in ways that may result in injury, death, or loss to persons on or around the equine;
- The unpredictability of an equine's reaction to sounds, sudden movement, unfamiliar objects, persons, or other animals;
- Hazards, including, but not limited to, surface or subsurface conditions;
- A collision with another equine, another animal, a person, or an object;
- The potential of an equine activity participant to act in a negligent manner that may contribute to injury, death, or loss to the person of the participant or to other persons, including but not limited to, failing to maintain control over an equine or failing to act within the ability of the participant.

I AGREE to release the USPC, its successors or assigns, officials, officers, directors, employees, agents, personnel, volunteers and affiliated organizations from all claims including, but not limited to, claims for money or property, disability, covenants, actions, suits, causes or action, obligations, debts, costs, expenses, attorneys' fees, judgments, orders and liabilities of whatsoever kind or nature in law, equity or otherwise, whether now known or unknown, suspected or unsuspected, and whether concealed or hidden, including but not limited to any state or federal statutory or common law claim or remedy of any kind whatsoever arising out of or in any way connected with any Harm to me or my horse and for any Harm caused by me or my horse to others, even if the Harm resulted, directly or indirectly, from the negligence of the USPC or the USPC activity.

I AGREE to expressly assume all risks of Harm to me or my horse, including Harm resulting from the negligence of the USPC or the USPC activity, and specifically agree to the applicable state statute/law regarding equine/farm animal activity liability and signed posting (if any), in any state in which I or my child participates in a USPC activity. A true copy for all state statutes in effect at the time of the execution of this agreement is attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference as if set out fully in the text of this document.

I AGREE to indemnify (that is, to pay any losses, damages, or costs incurred by) the USPC and the USPC activity and to hold them harmless with respect to claims for Harm to me or my horse, and for claims made by others for any Harm caused by me or my horse in the USPC activity. USPC shall promptly notify you in writing of any claim or action brought against USPC or any of its local clubs or affiliated organization in respect of which indemnity may be sought against you, setting forth the particulars of such claim or action and you will assume the defense thereof, including the employment of counsel satisfactory to USPC and the payment of all expenses.

I AGREE that neither I, nor any one claiming through me, will hereafter bring, commence, prosecute or maintain, or cause or permit to be brought, commenced, prosecuted or maintained, any suit or action, either at law or in equity, in any court in the United States or in any state thereof, or elsewhere, against the USPC, its successors or assigns, for, on account of, arising out of, or in any way connected with any Harm to me or my horse, and that neither I, nor any one claiming though me, will enforce, prosecute, or recover upon, or attempt to enforce, prosecute, or recover upon, any claim or right of action whatsoever, which I, or any one claiming though me, may now have or hereafter assert, in any way connected with claims for Harm to me or my horse, and for claims made by others for any Harms caused by me or my horse at the USPC activity.

I AGREE this Agreement is the entire agreement of the parties, and supersedes all prior oral and written understandings and agreements. This Agreement may be modified only by a written amendment signed by both parties.

I AGREE that if any provision of the Agreement is found to be invalid or illegal by a court of competent jurisdiction, the remaining provisions shall be construed as if the affected provision had not been included in order to effectuate the intent of the parties.

In the event this form is signed by the parent/guardian of a child, then all representations and acknowledgements herein are expressly made by, for, and on behalf of the parent/guardian and child.

By signing below, I AGREE to be bound by all applicable USPC rules and all terms and provisions of the USPC activity. I acknowledge that I enter into this release after having read the same, and place my signature hereto of my own free voluntary act and deed. By signing below, I represent to the USPC that I fully understand its contents, that I do not need any further explanation, and I waive any further explanation.

STABLE MANAGER JOB DESCRIPTION

Stable Managers are Vital Team Members

Horse Management is an important part of Pony Club; we make it a requirement at all Pony Club mounted Rallies, and we also make it a requirement that teams have Stable Managers. Stable Managers are unique to Pony Club, and their job is important to the team and deserves respect. The Stable Manager has the most important job on the team! Pony Club members and their parents should appreciate the skill and knowledge it requires to do this job.

In Pony Club, Stable Managers are so much more than an extra set of hands. They are an integral part of the team because they help keep the team working together to offer the best care of their equipment and horses throughout the competition. Stable Managers keep the team organized and on track, they make sure the ponies are properly cared for and assist their teammates in caring for their horses and themselves. Our Rallies create an opportunity for our members to demonstrate what they have learned in their Pony Club lessons as they are progressing through the Standards of Proficiency. Our members study their manuals and educational materials and learn Horse Management skills from hands-on experience – we expect a lot more than from them than just "tending to horses." They learn the science of horses, they learn to be responsible, to care for and appreciate horses, they learn to be organized and manage their time and their teammates' time. And, in addition, the Stable Manager for a team learns a lot about managing people.

As we gear up for Regional Rallies and Championships, there is sometimes a *misunderstanding about the role of a Stable Manager*. Many times, the Stable Manager is the glue that holds a team together and keeps everyone working towards the same goals. Take on the challenge of being a Stable Manager, it just might be the greatest experience you can have at a rally!

Stable Manager Job Description

PRIOR TO RALLY:

- 1. Work closely with team Captain to plan ahead for all required equipment, both team and individual. Assist the Captain as may be requested.
- 2. Be sure that all team members have created a stall card and assist in filling in the required information if necessary. Plan on some sort of protection for the stall cards against weather exposure.
- 3. Bring any equipment as indicated in planning with Captain and be sure that all team equipment is properly labeled with the team name (*club/team name/region if Championships team*)
- 4. For an overnight rally only, offer to create a feed chart for use by team members at rally and ask all team members to provide you with the required information in advance of rally so that the feed chart can be prepared ahead of time.

AT RALLY:

1. Upon arrival, assist teammates in setting up stalls for horses as first priority – care of horses should take precedence over setting up tack room.

STABLE MANAGER JOB DESCRIPTION, Cont.

- 2. Supervise the set-up of the team tack room, making certain that it is set up in an organized manner. Make sure all teammates know where equipment can be found so that they can locate it if needed and you are not present. Make sure all items are properly labeled (hopefully this was done at home prior to arrival at rally)
 - a) Be present when Horse Management Judges come to check Required Equipment, if possible, and be able to explain the intended use for each piece of equipment.
- 3. Assist in stable areas as may be necessary or indicated throughout the rally. A few examples are: assisting in picking out stalls, refilling water buckets, grooming teammate's horse or tacking up as help may be requested by teammates or team captain. Generally, each team member is responsible for the care of his/her own horse, stall and personal equipment; the Stable Manager provides an <u>extra set of hands</u> and should never be expected to take on the total care of team horses.
- 4. Be familiar with the team schedule as posted in tack room and assist team members in keeping to that schedule. Check this schedule frequently and help keep team members stay on time.
- 5. Assist team members in preparing for turnout inspections and accompany team members to their assigned station, if possible, unless it is necessary to stay in stable area to help another team member prepare for turnout inspection.
- 6. Try to be at ringside to cheer teammates on and to be available to assist when ride is done. Consider what equipment or supplies should be brought to the ringside that will be useful at the end of teammate's ride.
- 7. Eventing Rally-be prepared to help in the Vet Box with cooling out of teammates' mounts, make sure all necessary equipment has made it to the Vet Box
- 8. Make periodic checks in stable area to ensure that:
 - a) Tack room area is neat and clean. Tack room door is left closed unless team member(s) are in the tack room
 - b) Area in front of all stalls is kept clean and "raked or swept"
 - c) Stall cards stay in place on all team stalls
 - d) Stalls are picked out as needed do not allow manure to pile up and remove any obvious wet spots.
 - e) Lead lines are properly hung outside of stalls when not in use.
 - f) Haynets, if used, are properly hung and stay at proper height at all times even when empty.

AT RALLY END:

- 1. Supervise the break-down of the team tack room (competitors are sometimes allowed to start break down of tack room prior to award ceremony).
- 2. Assist teammates in stripping of stalls as indicated or instructed at overall briefing (most often the stalls have to be completely stripped and checked by Horse Management Judges).
- 3. Be sure that the team tack room is swept/raked after all items are removed

STABLE MANAGER JOB DESCRIPTION, Cont.

- 4. Be sure that the area in front of each stall is swept/raked after the stall is stripped and horse has left the stable area.
- 5. Assist the team captain as indicated or delegated.
- Upon arrival at home, check all club-owned equipment and restock as instructed by your club/center leaders. Return the equipment to the proper storage location
- 7. Together with the team captain, prepare a report to present to the Club or Center. Be sure to include in this report:
 - a. What went well for the team, what did not go well keep personal criticism out of this report and stick with specifics such as "lacked time management skills" or club utility kit was missing ______
 - b. Suggestions for preparing teams before rally/making the team better prepared for rally

Camino Real Region, USPC, Inc. Advisors for Rally Teams

What is an Advisor?

A C-or-above rated Pony Clubber that wants to share their knowledge and experience with inexperienced D rated and/or new Pony Club members. An Advisor is a positive role model. An Advisor represents the very best of pony club; acknowledging its members by setting an explanatory example by wearing appropriate attire at all pony club activities. This includes; appropriate footwear, polo shirt, and khaki slacks (when possible).

Who can be an Advisor?

Any C-or-above rated member in good standing that is recommended by their DC and not competing at that rally.

When can you be an Advisor?

At any non-qualifying rally, in which you are not competing and your club is sending a team of D and/or unrated Pony Clubbers. You can also volunteer your services to other teams if your club is not sending a team. To do this, your club DC should contact the organizer and tell them you are available to be an Advisor. What are the responsibilities of an Advisor?

Advisors mentor, encourage, and teach Pony Clubbers who are new to the rally world; to give guidance and support to teams members. Adhere to all Pony Club rules, including riding disciplines and Horse Management rulebooks. Act as a cheerleader, promoting a positive sports attitude regardless of the outcome. By demonstration, exemplifies the USPC Mission Statement, and Pony Club Pledge. What an Advisor is NOT : A Horse Manager, someone to be taken advantage of, or a dictator.

Specific things you may, and may not, do as an Advisor:

- May advise team on how to set up, for example where to put things and how to organize May not do the actual setting up of tack and stall areas
- May help lift heavy objects
- May not do work of the team or horse manager, example, groom horses, fill
- water buckets, clean up trailer or stall areas

• May help adjust tack if team members are too small to reach May not tack up horses

- May advise team on strategy to get work done in a workman-like manner May not do the work
- May do course walks and answer questions on technique and procedure
- May not coach or provide assistance, that would be considered unauthorized, for example fetching a forgotten crop
- May mediate disagreements within the team
- May not dictate to the team how to settle problems
- May provide emotional support to team members May not play favorites within the team
- May remind team members of their schedule
- May not dictate to teams when to do any specific task
- May remind the team to eat and drink plenty of fluids
