Order of grooming

Why groom:

- a. to check him for injuries or problems
- b. to prevent sores from dirt under tack
- c. to condition his skin and make the coat shiny
- d. to promote good circulation of the blood
- e. it feels good to the horse

When to groom:

- a. check pony everyday
- b. before you <mark>saddle</mark>
- c. after you ride to remove sweat

The ORDER of Grooming

Tie up your horse

- use breakaway halter
- use quick release knot

2. Pick out feet.

- use brush to clean off front of hoof
- check each shoe (on tight and clinches smooth)
- 3. Rubber or plastic currycomb to break up caked on mud & stimulate skin
 - rub in circles
 - start at top of neck, work back and down
 - don't use on head, lower legs
 - metal currycombs are never used on horses they are for cleaning other brushes
- 4. Dandy brush to take away dirt stirred up by currycomb
 - start at top of neck
 - short, snappy strokes to flick away the dirt
 - don't use in areas where the horse has been clipped
 - another name for Dandy brush is "hard brush" and "stiff brush"
- 5. Body brush to clean away dust and scruff
 - start at the top
 - use short, firm strokes in direction of hair

- clean the brush after a few strokes
- can be used everywhere, every where clipped
- another name for body brush = soft brush
- it is the best brush for getting horse's coat clean & shiny

6. Mane and tail

- pick out the big twigs, burrs, etc.
- separate the tangles by hand, a small section at a time
- start at the BOTTOM, work up, use a mane brush, plastic comb, or dandy brush.
- try not to break or pull the hair
- stand off to one side when working on the tail

7. Rub the coat

- use rub rag or stable rubber
- bear down and rub firmly, in long strokes in direction of the hair
- rubbing warms up the skin, brings out the oils, and make the coat shiny and sleek

The following areas of your horse should always be checked, and the task is optional if no signs of dirt or distress exist.

- 8. Clean head and face with small, soft face brush
 - * optional can use soft (body) brush instead
- 9. Clean eylids, nose, lips
 - use damp sponge or cotton balls
- 10. clean the dock and sheath/utter
 - use a separate sponge
- 11. hoof dressing
 - wipe away excess
- 12. tame the mane
 - wet water brush to dampen the roots of the mane
 - brush it neatly to the right side of the neck
- 13. fly spray
